



Brain of Dublin: 2019-20 Qualifier

Welcome to the qualifying quiz for the inaugural Brain of Dublin competition. This is a solo written quiz, consisting of 50 questions plus a tie-breaker. You will be allowed **30 minutes** to complete your entry. You should complete the details below (name, mobile number, etc.) before you start.

After completing the questions, your scores will be marked by another random player in the room. After you have taken back your paper and confirmed your score is correct, your entire paper (not just the first sheet) should then be handed up to the proctor.

The top scorers (exact number to be confirmed, but probably 32 or 48) will qualify for the competition proper, beginning in December. This will involve individual quiz matches between 4 players, with the top 1 or 2 scorers continuing to the next round. These elimination rounds will continue every month, until the final 4 players meet in the Brain of Dublin final in April.

Each round of the competition will be held on the same night as the monthly Dublin Quiz League matches (and immediately after those matches, i.e. at approx. 9.30pm), meaning that the first two rounds will be on **Monday December 4th** and **Monday January 27th**. Please be sure to indicate your availability for those dates on this page, so that we can avoid scheduling you for a match when you're unavailable.

All results will be announced via email, using the email address you provide below. Results will also be posted on the Dublin Quiz League group on Facebook.

Please avoid discussing these questions on social media, since this qualifier is being held on more than one date.

Q12	Held between May 30 th and July 14 th this year, the 2019 Cricket World Cup was hosted by which country or countries ?	
Q13	Grover Cleveland is the only US President to serve two non-consecutive terms in the White House. Which president served in between Cleveland's two terms? (in other words, from 1889-1893)	
Q14	@tomhappens is the Twitter account of what Irish radio presenter and rock band frontman?	
Q15	What charitable organisation was founded by a Methodist minister in East London in 1865, and was originally called the Christian Revival Society, then the East London Christian Mission, before receiving its much more well-known name?	

Q16	The name of which Leinster town , one of the largest towns in Ireland by population, comes from the Irish for “the cave”?	
Q17	Constance Reid is the title character’s maiden name in what controversial 20th century novel , first published in 1928?	
Q18	Founded in 1864 in Mountmellick, Co. Laois, what Irish chain of department stores is best known for their former advertising slogan “Almost Nationwide”, reflecting the fact that until the 1980s, their presence was confined to Munster and South Leinster?	
Q19	Used as a staple food by millions of people in tropical countries, what edible starch is extracted from the roots of the cassava plant?	
Q20	Which Irish act headlined the first ever Slane concert in 1981?	
Q21	With a capacity of over 81,000, the largest stadium in Germany is the Westfalenstadion (currently known as the Signal Iduna Park for sponsorship reasons). It is the home ground of which Bundesliga football club ?	
Q22	Which animal featured on the Irish 20 pence coin, introduced in 1986 and withdrawn when the euro was introduced in 2002? The same design had featured on the Irish half-crown coin used between 1928 and 1967.	
Q23	Damsons and greengages are both cultivars (cultivated varieties) of which fruit ?	
Q24	Which Dublin postal district includes Harold’s Cross, Templeogue, Kimmage and Terenure? It was created in the mid-1980s and was originally going to be called “Dublin 26” until residents objected due to fears over property devaluation.	
Q25	Lefkosia is the local-language name for which EU capital city ?	
Q26	Formed in Omagh in 1969, the Irish pop band Chips was fronted by what singer , who later went on to win the Eurovision Song Contest?	
Q27	The Etruscan civilisation flourished from approximately the 8 th century BC to the 1 st century AD in which modern-day country ?	
Q28	Which Irish city was nicknamed "Linenopolis" in the 19th century, due to its being the world's largest producer of linen at the time?	
Q29	Between 1995 and 1999, Dublin soccer club Home Farm FC entered into a sponsorship deal with an English Premier League team, leading them to temporarily change their name to what? (You can simply answer with the name of the Premier League team in question)	
Q30	Making their first comic-book appearance in 1964, the Sinister Six are a team of super-villains who serve as a recurring adversary for which superhero ? Three of the original six villains in the group were Electro, Kraven the Hunter, and Vulture.	

Q31	$\frac{4}{3}\pi r^3$ is the formula for calculating the volume of what three-dimensional shape , where <i>r</i> represents its radius?	
Q32	Completed in 1953, Áras Mhic Dhiarmada is the official name of what major Dublin building , the majority of which contains the headquarters of the Department of Social Welfare? (a.k.a. the Department of Employment Affairs and Social Protection)	
Q33	Adam, Benjamin, Caleb, Daniel, Ephraim, Frank and Gideon are all characters in what 1950s movie musical ?	
Q34	Ireland has a total of 6 national parks, covering 650 km ² in total, or just under 1% of the land area of the country. Three of them are The Burren, Connemara, and Wicklow Mountains National Park – name any of the other three?	
Q35	The Schlieffen Plan was name given to the German WWI plan to invade which two European countries? The execution of the plan led to Britain declaring war on Germany in August 1914.	
Q36	A distinctive feature of Dublin’s Grattan Bridge (also known as Capel Street Bridge) are ornate lamps featuring a hippocampus, a mythical creature consisting of a hybrid of what two animals?	
Q37	With a population of approximately 1.2 million, Bulawayo is the second-largest city in which African country?	
Q38	An instrumental version of the 1965 hit single “To Whom it Concerns” by the English singer Chris Andrews is better known to the Irish public as the theme tune to what television programme?	
Q39	“ <i>Half a league, half a league, half a league onward</i> ” is the opening line to what famous 19th century poem by Alfred, Lord Tennyson?	
Q40	Beating Castlebar Mitchels in the final on St Patrick’s Day 2016, name the most recent Dublin GAA club to win the All-Ireland Senior Football Club Championships?	
Q41	The IBRC (Irish Bank Resolution Corporation) was set up in 2011 as a merger between two bankrupt Irish financial institutions: Anglo Irish Bank, and what building society , founded in 1873?	
Q42	Only two elements in the periodic table are named after women. One is curium, jointly named after Marie Curie and her husband Pierre. What is the other element? It is number 109 on the periodic table and named after a Vienna-born physicist who was a pioneer in the field of nuclear fission in the 1930s and 40s.	
Q43	Frequently the target of vandals since its unveiling in 1701, a bronze equestrian statue of what controversial monarch stood on Dublin’s Dame Street for over two centuries until it was damaged by a bomb in 1928 and subsequently removed and melted down?	
Q44	In Norse mythology, while Asgard is the name given to the realm of the gods, what name is given to the realm of humans? (i.e. Earth)	

Q45	Approved in May 2019 by An Bord Pleanála, name the “new town” planned to be built in West Dublin in the coming years, containing over 10,000 new homes? The announcement came amid some controversy due to the lack of plans for upgraded transport infrastructure and other amenities.	
Q46	Name either of the Shakespeare plays which are set on the island of Sicily?	
Q47	Completed in 2018, name the residential and office building on Dublin’s Sir John Rogerson’s Quay which is currently the tallest building in the Republic of Ireland? With a height of 79 metres, it is 20 metres taller than Liberty Hall.	
Q48	What geographical feature would be denoted by the word “Clon” or “Cloon” in an Irish place name? (For example, Clonskeagh or Cloonkeen) Both come from the Irish word <i>Cluain</i> .	
Q49	What is the second-largest city in Yemen , which also lends its name to the gulf between Yemen and Somalia?	
Q50	Now commemorated by a statue on O’Connell Street, name the Mayo-born doctor, politician and newspaper proprietor who oversaw the “Vartry scheme”, a new water supply system for Dublin which was credited with a major improvement to the city’s public health in the late 19 th century?
