Q4a (Team A Person 4)	Alan Sugar, latterly known for his role on BBC TV's <i>The Apprentice</i> , founded which electronics company in 1968? He remained chairman of this company until 2008, the year after he had sold his stake in the business to BSkyB.	<u>Amstrad</u>

Q2a (Team B Person 2)	The port of which city is the world's busiest container port? This facility is located on the delta where the Yangtze River enters the East China Sea.	<u>Shanghai</u>
Q2b (Team A Person 2)	At the 2022 Eurovision Song Contest which country's act, The Kalush Orchestra, emerged victorious after receiving a record 439 points from the public televote?	<u>Ukraine</u>
Q3a (Team B Person 3)	Which former boxer, who represented Ireland at the 1988 Summer Olympics, was appointed Head coach of the Irish High Performance Boxing programme in 2003? Q1b (Team A Person 1)	While ASCII had been capable of encoding 128 characters, it was succeeded by UTF-8 which is capable of encoding over 1 million characters. This has allowed non-Latin characters such as mathematical symbols and (famously) emojis to be included. If the latter part of the UTF-8 name stands for "Transformation Format - 8-bit", what does the letter U represent, an information technology standard maintained by a namesake consortium?	<u>Unicode</u>
Q2a (Team B Person 2)	Which older brother of Royston Brady was a member of the Seanad from 2002 to 2007 and the Dáil from 2007 to 2011? His election in 2007 was somewhat remarkable as, having polled just 939 first preference votes, he subsequently gained a massive transfer from his running mate, Taoiseach Bertie Ahern. For obvious reasons, first <u>and</u> last name required.	<u>Cyprian Brady</u> (full name required)
Q2b (Team A Person 2)	What type of doctor gave David Seville a Billboard Hot 100 number one in 1958? A eurodance cover of the song by Danish group The Cartoons charted throughout Europe in 1999, hitting No 2 in both Ireland and the UK.	<u>Witch Doctor</u>
Q3a (Team B Person 3)	Which two-word portmanteau, first published in a tweet by British comedian and writer Dan Atkinson 45 minutes after Coleen Rooney's accusation, is used to describe ongoing arguments between Rooney and Rebekah Vardy, which culminated in a libel trial at London's Royal Courts of Justice?	<u>Wagatha Christie</u>
Q3b (Team A Person 3)	What variant of toothpaste was invented by Leonard Marraffino in 1955? He subsequently sold his patent to Unilever, who marketed the novelty under an apt brand name in the early 1960s. Aquafresh is a popular brand that currently produces toothpaste of this type.	<u>Striped</u> toothpaste (originally sold under the brand name "Stripe")

Q3 Which Toyota car model won the European CotY award in 2005, the first hybrid electric car to do so?	<u>Prius</u>
Q4 The current holder of European Car of the Year is the EV6, a battery electric compact crossover SUV produced by which manufacturer?	<u>Kia</u>

Q1 In the works of Roddy Doyle, the food item referred to as a "Dunphy" is a pork sausage dipped in what flour mixture before subsequently being deep fried?	<u>Batter</u>

Q2 Which iconic Irish political leader killed Dublin Corporation member John D'Esterre in a duel on 2nd February 1815, at Bishops court, County Kildare?	Daniel <u>O'Connell</u>
Q3 French soldier Georges-Charles d'Anthès fatally wounded which Russian poet in a duel in 1837? Somewhat prophetically, several of this man's works had contained scenes of duelling.	Alexander <u>Pushkin</u>
Q4 In 1809, future British Prime Minister George Canning was injured in a duel with which political rival? This other duellist, who was born in Dublin in 1769, served as Foreign Secretary from 1812-22 and was the British plenipotentiary at the Congress of Vienna. Q1 Which singer-songwriter won the first series of <i>American Idol</i> in 2002? Her debut single, <i>A Moment Like This</i> , topped the US Billboard Hot 100, and since then she has sold over 25 million albums worldwide and won three Grammy Awards.	Kelly <u>Clarkson</u>
Q2 Which singer-songwriter won the fourth season of <i>American Idol</i> in 2005? Her debut single, <i>Inside Your Heaven</i> , made her the only country artist to debut atop the Billboard Hot 100. In 2007 she became the second country artist to win the Grammy Award for Best New Artist and she has since won a further seven Grammys.	Carrie <u>Underwood</u>
Q3 Which American singer-songwriter rose to fame in 2009 after finishing as runner-up on the eighth season of <i>American Idol</i> ? Alongside his solo career, this man has collaborated with rock band Queen as their touring lead vocalist since 2011.	Adam <u>Lambert</u>
Q4 Which singer and actress won the sixth season of <i>American Idol</i> at age 17, becoming the youngest winner in the series' history? Her third single, <i>No Air</i> , a collaboration with Chris Brown, is currently the third highest-selling single by any <i>American Idol</i> contestant, selling over 3 million copies in the US. The song was also nominated for a Grammy Award.	Jordin <u>Sparks</u>

Q2 The black lip, gold lip and white lip are three types of bivalve, which all have in common the production of what hard, glistening objects within their soft tissue?	<u>Pearls</u> (in oysters)
Q3 Medieval Christians would collect a shell of which bivalve while at the city of Santiago de Compostela, Spain, as evidence of having made the journey along the Camino de Santiago or Way of St James? This link has led to these creatures being called <i>coquille St. Jacques</i> in French and <i>Jakobsmuscheln</i> in German.	<u>Scallop</u>
Q4 Which species of mussel, originally native to the lakes of southern Russia and Ukraine, has become an invasive species in many countries worldwide, including Ireland? This species gets its common name from a pattern commonly seen on their shells.	<u>Zebra</u> mussel (<i>Dreissena polymorpha</i>)
