British Overseas Territories

With a total population of 270,000, the 14 British dependencies that collectively make up the "British Overseas Territories" represent the last vestiges of the British Empire.

Q1 Not counting the British Antarctic Territory, whose boundaries are disputed, what is the largest British Overseas Territory by area? This controversial archipelago off the coast of South America is 12,000km ² in area, just slightly smaller than Northern Ireland.	The <u>Falkland</u> Islands (or Las <u>Malvinas</u>)
Q2 Primarily consisting of two military bases, the British Overseas Territory of Akrotiri and Dhekelia is located on what island country?	<u>Cyprus</u>
Q3 What British Overseas Territory is nicknamed "The Emerald Isle of the Caribbean", in part due to its relatively large proportion of inhabitants with Irish ancestry? Uniquely, its flag features both a Union Jack and a harp.	<u>Montserrat</u>
Q4 What is the capital - and only settlement - of the Pitcairn Islands, the British Overseas Territory whose population is notable for being mainly descended from the HMS Bounty mutineers? This town shares its name with a Dublin suburb.	<u>Adamstown</u>

80s Two-Hit Wonders

Q1 Although they had several more hits in their native US, the rock band Survivor only hit the charts twice on this side of the Pond, with <i>Eye of the Tiger</i> in 1982 and <i>Burning Heart</i> in 1985. Both songs were written for entries in what movie franchise?	<u>Rocky</u>
Q2 English singer Jona Lewie's two chart hits were both originally released in 1980: <i>You'll Always Find Me in the Kitchen at Parties</i> , and which classic Christmas song? Thanks to streaming, this song has re-entered the UK chart every year since 2015.	<u>Stop the Cavalry</u>
Q3 What Scottish act's only two UK Top 30 hits were <i>Mary's Prayer</i> in 1987 and <i>The Second Summer of Love</i> in 1989? You might assume that this act was a solo singer rather than a band, since they took their name from a movie character played by Frank Sinatra in a 1950s musical. (Two word answer required)	<u>Danny Wilson</u> (the musical was <i>Meet Danny Wilson</i>)
Q4 Scottish singer Jim Diamond had two solo Top 5 hits on the UK chart: <i>I Should Have Known Better</i> in 1984 and <i>Hi Ho Silver</i> in 1986. Before going solo, he had had a previous hit as the lead singer of what band, who reached No. 3 in 1982 with <i>I Won't Let You Down</i> ?	<u>Ph.D.</u>

Unsolved Murders

Q1	Although their authenticity is unproven, the so-called "Dear Boss" letter and the "From Hell" letter are two famous pieces of correspondence claimed to be sent by what perpetrator of at least 5 unsolved murders in 1880s London?	<u>Jack the Ripper</u>
Q2	One of the most famous unsolved murders in American history is 22-year old Elizabeth Short, gruesomely killed in Los Angeles in 1947. In the multiple books and movies inspired by her case, she is frequently referred to by what floral nickname?	The <u>Black Dahlia</u>
Q3	The case of Moss Moore, a County Kerry farmer murdered by an unknown assailant in 1958, was the inspiration for what 1965 stage play (later adapted into a film) after it emerged that he had been involved in a long-running territorial dispute with a neighbour?	The <u>Field</u> (by John B. Keane)
Q4	Responsible for multiple unsolved murders in San Francisco in the late 1960s, the infamous Zodiac killer took his name from a series of anonymous letters he sent to the police, which he signed with the "crosshairs" logo of Zodiac - a European company that produce what items?	<u>Watches</u>

Missing Statues

Q1	The famous "fourth plinth" in London's Trafalgar Square was originally intended to hold a statue of what 19th century British king? (Name and number required) A lack of funds meant the statue was never commissioned, so the plinth sat empty for over 150 years before being used for public art projects beginning in the late 1990s.	<u>William IV</u>
Q2	Similar to the fourth plinth in Trafalgar Square, Dublin's City Hall has had an empty plinth outside for over 150 years, since a statue of what Irish statesman was moved indoors? In 2021, a new public artwork was unveiled to fill the space vacated by the statue.	Daniel <u>O'Connell</u>
Q3	During the so-called "Indigenous Day of Rage" in October 2020, protestors in Portland, Oregon toppled two statues of Republican US presidents due to their alleged racist stances. Name either president? The statues have not yet been replaced while the city council debate their future.	Theodore <u>Roosevelt</u> or Abraham <u>Lincoln</u> (accept either)
Q4	Created in 2016 by the Italian artist Maurizio Cattelan, the sculpture titled <i>America</i> is a solid gold fully-functional replica of what everyday item? Its current whereabouts are unknown since it was stolen in 2019 while installed in Blenheim Palace in England.	<u>Toilet</u>

The League of Ireland's Early Days

Q1 The League of Ireland and the FAI Cup were both held for the first time in the 1921-22 season. What Dublin football club won both competitions that season? At the time, this team played their home matches in Inchicore, not at the Guinness brewery as their name might suggest.	St. <u>James's Gate</u>
Q2 8 teams competed in the first League of Ireland season, all from Dublin. 6 of them were St. James's Gate, Dublin United, Frankfort, Jacobs, YMCA and Olympia. Name either of the other two clubs - the only two still currently playing in the League of Ireland Premier Division?	<u>Shelbourne</u> or <u>Bohemians</u> (accept either)
Q3 In the League of Ireland's second season, what Leinster club became the first non-Dublin team to take part? Still a League of Ireland club today (currently in the First Division), this club's ground is often referred to as Lissywollen after the townland where it is located.	<u>Athlone</u> Town
Q4 In the 1924-25 season, what team from Cork became the first Munster team to play in the League of Ireland? Later known as Cork FC, at the time of joining the league they were named after the major Cork factory where the team was founded.	<u>Fordsons</u> (accept <u>Ford</u>)

Names Have Been Changed To Avoid Confusion

Q1 Following the release of her 2001 self-titled debut album, Christian pop singer Katy Hudson adopted her mother's maiden name to avoid confusion with Hollywood star Kate Hudson. What was Ms. Hudson's new stage name by the time she released her first "secular" music a few years later?	Katy <u>Perry</u>
Q2 American actors Diane Hall (born 1946) and Michael John Douglas (born 1951) both had to pick new surnames when joining the Screen Actors Guild, since there were existing performers with similar names. What new surname did they both pick?	<u>Keaton</u>
Q3 The fashion and homewares retailer TK Maxx is known by what slightly different name in its native US? When expanding to Europe in the 1990s it was forced to change its name to avoid confusion with a similarly-named UK retail chain.	<u>TJ Maxx</u> (the UK retailer was TJ Hughes)
Q4 The American brewer Anheuser-Busch and the Eastern European brewer Budvar have been embroiled in a decades-long trademark battle over the "Budweiser" name. As a result of this dispute, the European beer - available in Ireland as "Budweiser Budvar" - is sold in the US under what different name, reflecting its country of origin?	<u>Czechvar</u>

Native Irish Wildlife

Q1 What distinctive mammal is the largest terrestrial carnivore native to Ireland? It may help you to know that this creature is one of the main characters in the classic children's book <i>The Wind in the Willows</i> .	European <u>badger</u>
Q2 The only species of land reptile native to Ireland is the viviparous lizard, also known as the "common lizard". The word "viviparous" is a scientific term indicating that unlike the vast majority of reptiles, this creature does not do what?	<u>Lay eggs</u> (viviparous is Latin for "living birth")
Q3 Dublin's Phoenix Park is famously home to roughly 400 wild deer, the descendants of a herd introduced to the park in the 17th century. Which species of deer are they? The name derives from their pale brown colour.	European <u>fallow</u> deer
Q4 <i>The Guinness Book of Records</i> (nowadays known as <i>Guinness World Records</i>) had its origins in the 1950s after members of a County Wexford hunting party got into a debate about whether which native bird is the fastest game bird in Europe? (Spoiler alert: it is)	European golden <u>plover</u> <i>[rhymes with "cover"]</i>

Pants on Fire

Q1 What 12-time Olympic medal-winning American swimmer was suspended for 10 months following an incident during the 2016 Olympics where he and three teammates falsely claimed to have been robbed at gunpoint during a night out in Rio?	Ryan <u>Lochte</u>
Q2 Name the recently-elected New York Republican congressman who has resisted calls to resign despite fabricating large parts of his CV and admitting to multiple major falsehoods, including claiming to be Jewish and stating that his mother died during 9/11?	George <u>Santos</u>
Q3 In 2012, UK Liberal Democrat MP Chris Huhne [<i>pronounced "hewn"</i>] and his ex-wife were both sentenced to 8 months in prison for perverting the course of justice following the revelation that they had both lied to police to enable Huhne to avoid what punishment?	<u>Penalty points / speeding ticket / driving ban</u> (accept any similar answer) (Huhne was caught speeding but to avoid a driving ban claimed his then-wife was behind the wheel)
Q4 Name the American actor, best known for playing Jamal Lyon on the TV series <i>Empire</i> , who last year was sentenced to 5 months in jail for a notorious 2019 incident where he paid two accomplices to stage a fake hate crime attack against himself?	Jussie <u>Smollett</u>
