| Q2The 1987 song Nothing's Gonna Stop Us Now reached No. 1 in the Irish charts for the band Starship. Starship were an <br> evolution from what 60s band, via not one but two name changes? Hits for the original group include Somebody to Love <br> and White Rabbit. |
| Q3Fontaines DC were formed in 2017 as The Fontaines, but added the "DC" due to a band in LA already having the same Airplane <br> name. 21 years earlier another Irish group, The Frames, had made the same addition to their name for the US release of the <br> album Fitzcarraldo. On both occasions "DC" stood for which two words? |
| Q4Which famous rock group were formed in 1968 as The New Yardbirds? While the name may always have been intended as <br> a temporary one, the group did complete a tour of Scandinavia under it before changing to their much more well-known <br> moniker. |

## Literary hoaxes

Q1 The career of British historian Hugh Trevor-Roper reached its nadir in 1983, when he erroneously authenticated which infamous set of journals, supposedly discovered by German illustrator Konrad Kujau? In fact, Kujau had forged these documents.
Q2 In 1972, American author Clifford Irving was convicted of faking the autobiography of which reclusive millionaire? Irving Howard Hughes later claimed that he believed the subject of the book was so antisocial that he would not denounce the book or file a lawsuit for libel.
Q3 In 1761, the Scottish writer, poet and politician James Macpherson published a cycle of epic poems supposedly written by Ossian which 3rd century bard? Macpherson claimed to have discovered and translated these from Gaelic, but by the mid-19th century it was generally accepted that he had written them himself.
Q4 Name the American journalist who worked for progressive magazine The New Republic from 1995 to 1998, until it was revealed that many of his published articles were fabrications? The subsequent scandal was dramatised in a 2003 film (the film was Shattered Glass ) starring Hayden Christensen, whose title involved a pun on the journalist's surname.

Q1 Sight and Sound is a British monthly film magazine published by the British Film Institute (BFI). Since 1952, it has conducted
Once every ten years / a regular poll of the Greatest Films of All Time, based on a survey of critics and directors. How often are the results of this famous poll published in the magazine?
Q2 In the eight Sight and Sound polls published since 1952, which film is the most successful, having topped the poll in every Citizen Kane edition between 1962 and 2002? This 1941 film was directed by and starred Orson Welles.
