The building was then demolished to make way for a branch of which now-defunct English retailer, notable at the time for being their first store outside the UK? Q3 No. 8 on the Forbes list is Karen Lynch, who is also the highest-ranking female chief executive on the Fortune 500 since she became CEO of what American healthcare group in 2021? This company is the namesake of the largest chain of pharmacies in the US.	CVS
Q4 The highest non-politician on the list (No. 4) is the woman who has served as CEO of General Motors since 2014.
