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Animals in Art
Q1 American artist Cassius Marcellus Coolidge (1844-1934) is best known for a series of 18 paintings portraying anthropomorphised
Poker dogs playing which card game?
Q2 What animal is depicted in a famous woodcut created by German artist Albrecht Dürer in 1515? As he had never seen one, the Rhinoceros image is based on a written description and brief sketch of an example of these animals that had been shipped to Lisbon earlier that year.
Q3 Which British author wrote the original short story on which the 1963 Alfred Hitchcock movie The Birds is based? It was first published in her 1952 collection The Apple Tree.
Q4 On their 1974 album The Táin, Irish rock group Horslips included a track named after which breed of cattle? The use of this name Charolais on an album based on Irish mythology was a lyrical joke, as this breed of bovine had only been introduced to Ireland 10 years before.

## Middle Aged Medicine

Q1 The wealthiest in medieval society could afford a consultation with what rank of the medical profession? Holders of this title earned it by being university-trained. Today, the term lives on, particularly in North America, where it indicates a person engaged in general medical practice.
Q2 In the Middle Ages, surgery was seldom conducted by physicians, but instead by the members of which profession? Already possessing razors and the coordination indispensable to their trade, these people were called upon for numerous tasks including Barbers / BarberSurgeons bloodletting, teeth extraction and even the amputation of limbs.
Q3 Still in use in the Middle Ages was the theory of humorism, in which the health of the human body was related to the balance of Bile four vital bodily fluids, or "humors". As detailed by Hippocrates, these four fluids were blood, phlegm and yellow and black variants of what liquid?
