

Q1. Dom DeLillo's <i>Noise</i> , Zadie Smith's <i>Teeth</i> and Jack London's <i>Fang</i> – what adjective can be added in front of all three of these nouns to complete the title of novels by these authors?
Q2. Name this Irish actor, known for his roles in 28 Days Later and Peaky Blinders, who has recently received critical acclaim for playing the title character in Christopher Nolan's 2023 film Oppenheimer?
Q3. Keri Hulme (for <i>The Bone People</i> in 1985) and Eleanor Catton (for <i>The Luminaries</i> in 2013) are the only two authors from what country to have won the Booker Prize?
Q4. Grossing a combined US\$32 billion worldwide since 2008, the <i>MCU</i> is an ongoing superhero movie franchise consisting of 32 films to date, most recently <i>Guardians of the Galaxy Vol. 3</i> , released in May 2023. What does the initialism "MCU" stand for?
Q5. The "a" in <i>about</i> , the "e" in <i>taken</i> and the "i" in <i>family</i> are three examples in English of a vowel sound known by what name? Represented by an upside-down lowercase "e" in the International Phonetic Alphabet, this is the sound produced when the lips, tongue, and jaw are completely relaxed and is the most common vowel sound in English.
Q6. One of the most iconic movie scenes of the 1970s, John Travolta's solo dance in Saturday Night Fever was accompanied on-screen by what song by the Bee Gees? Perhaps surprisingly, it was <u>not</u> one of the songs written for the movie soundtrack, but an existing Bee Gees song that had been a US Number 1 hit over a year before the release of the film.
 Q7. Nicknamed "The Ghost Who Walks", name this crime-fighting character, the titular hero of a daily American newspaper strip which has run continuously since 1936? Created by Lee Falk, this character is considered one of the first superheroes, although (like Batman) he does not have superpowers, instead relying on his wits and physical skills to battle evildoers.

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Q16. American author Gregory Mcdonald (1937-2008) is best known for a series of crime novels featuring what character? This wisecracking investigative reporter has been played on the silver screen by Chevy Chase (1985 and 1989) and Jon Hamm (2022).	
Q17. Pictured is the word "question" written in what language? Spoken by over 75 million people worldwide, this is one of the official languages of Singapore and Sri Lanka – not to mention the southernmost state in India, which partly shares its name with this language (and the people who speak it).	
Q18. Only four writers have won the Pulitzer Prize for Fiction more than once: Booth Tarkington, John Updike, Colson Whitehead and which other author ? He is the only one of the four to have also won the Nobel Prize for Literature, doing so in 1949.	
Q19. Famously used as a yardstick of female representation in movies, the so-called "Bechdel Test" was devised by American cartoonist Alison Bechdel in a 1985 edition of what comic strip, which ran weekly from 1983 to 2008?	
 Q20. Directed by Georges Franju, what cult 1960 French horror film concerns a plastic surgeon who murders young women to serve as face transplant donors for his daughter, who wears a mask after being disfigured in a car accident? The film inspired a 1984 hit single by Billy Idol whose chorus mentions both the film's French and English-language titles – you may answer with either. 	
Q21. Published in serial form between 1989 and 1998, what acclaimed graphic novel by writer Alan Moore and artist Eddie Campbell is a fictionalised retelling of the Jack the Ripper murders? Its two-word title is also the opening of an infamous 1888 letter supposedly written by the murderer.	
Q22. Released in 2022 to highly positive reviews, what is the title of the fifth film in the <i>Predator</i> franchise? It stars Amber Midthunder as a young Comanche warrior who protects her tribe against an alien Predator who lands in early 18 th century America.	

Q23. Name this Hong Kong-born actress, arguably best known for playing the female lead in Wong Kar-Wai's highly-acclaimed *In The Mood For Love* (2000)?

For her role in *Clean* (2004) alongside Nick Nolte, she became the first Asian performer to win Best Actress at the Cannes Film Festival.

Q24. First published in 9 volumes between 1759 and 1767, the picaresque novel <i>The Life and Opinions of Tristram Shandy, Gentleman</i> (often simply referred to as <i>Tristram Shandy</i>) is the best known work of what Anglo-Irish author and Anglican cleric, born in Tipperary in 1713?	
Q25. Only two African-born filmmakers have ever been nominated for Best Director at the Oscars. The first nomination was in 1997 for the Ugandan-born Australian director of <i>Shine</i> , while the second was a year later for the Egyptian-born Canadian director of <i>The Sweet Hereafter</i> . Name either of these directors?	
Q26. Published in 1910, <i>The Machine Stops</i> is a dystopian science fiction short story written by which English author?	
It is notable for its depictions of technology resembling videoconferencing and the Internet, several decades before their invention – although its author is not generally regarded as a science fiction writer: three of his best-known novels were adapted into Oscar-winning period dramas in the 1980s and 1990s.	
Q27. The subject of one of Japan's longest-running media franchises, what is the name of this fictional character?	
A blind swordsman who wields his weapons with a distinctive reverse grip, he was the main character in a series of 26 movies released between 1962 and 1989, plus a 1970s TV series and two modern movie remakes in the 2000s.	
Q28. The title characters in the movies <i>Mandy</i> (2018), <i>Nancy</i> (2018) and <i>To Leslie</i> (2022) were all played by what English actress , born in Tyneside in 1981?	
She was the subject of some controversy in early 2023 following the unorthodox celebrity-driven social media campaign that was used to secure her first Oscar nomination (for <i>To Leslie</i>).	


Q29. Born in 1986, **name this Nigerian author**, whose two published novels *The Fishermen* (2015) and *An Orchestra of Minorities* (2019) were both shortlisted for the Booker Prize?

Q30. Selling an estimated 30 million copies since its first volume in 2019, **what Japanese manga series** concerns an espionage agent who unwittingly marries an undercover assassin and adopts a daughter with telepathic abilities?



<u>World</u>

Q1. Flowing eastwards over the north of the country and over 650 km in length, what is the longest river in Italy? It shares its name with one of the Teletubbies.	
Q2. Adopted after independence in 1966, the flag of which African country features distinctive black-and-white stripes across the centre?	
The stripes are said to represent the country's racial diversity, as well as being a nod to the country's national animal, the plains zebra.	
Q3. One of the longest defined coastal routes in the world, what is the three-word name of the meandering 2,500 km road which stretches along Ireland's western coast, from Donegal to Cork? Taking in many of the country's most scenic sites, it has provided a significant boost to Ireland's tourism industry since its introduction in 2014.	
Q4. In 1973, the Chevrolet Impala became the first car to offer what safety feature?	
Although Ford and General Motors spent much of the late 70s and early 80s lobbying the US government against making them mandatory, today they are a standard feature of practically all new cars sold globally, and have been credited with a noticeable reduction in car crash fatalities since the 1990s.	



TURKEY

Q12. What is the name of the geocultural region shown on the map?

Some of its boundaries are not rigidly defined, but it is generally agreed to consist of parts of south-eastern Turkey, northern Iraq, northwestern Iran and northern Syria.

Q13. Opening in 2010 at a cost of €6 billion and consisting of three 57-storey towers topped by a 340-metre-long skyway, **what is the name** of this landmark casino and resort in Singapore? A <u>three-word</u> answer is required.

Q14. Most time zones in use around the world are defined as a whole number of hours offset from GMT (a.k.a. UTC). **What Canadian province** is the only part of the Americas which does <u>not</u> use a "whole number" time zone? This province is 3½ hours behind UTC in winter and 2½ hours in summer.

Q15. The 15th century Citadel of Qaitbay stands on the site of **which of the Seven Wonders of the Ancient World?**

After the wonder in question was destroyed by a series of earthquakes between the 10th and 14th centuries, some of the stone ruins were used in the construction of the citadel.

Q16. One of the world's busiest airports, Pudong is the main international airport serving **what Asian city?**

Q17. Over 10,000km² in area, Salar de Uyuni is the world's largest salt flat, located in **which South American country?**

Estimated to contain one of the largest lithium deposits in the world, the exceptional flatness of the surface is also used to calibrate the altimeters of Earth observation satellites.

Q18. Nowadays part of the larger Nouvelle-Aquitaine region, the traditional region of France highlighted on the map is the origin of the name of **what specific type of vehicle?**

While there is debate over the exact reason this name was used, the prevailing theory is that early examples of this vehicle used a hood or roof that physically resembled the raised hood of traditional cloaks worn by shepherds in this region.










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Sport & Games

Q1. Contested by men at every Winter Olympics to date and finally due to be added for women in 2026, "Nordic combined" consists of two events: cross-country skiing and **what other discipline** – also a Winter Olympic event in its own right?


 Q2. Name the Northern Irish jockey (born 1974) who holds the all-time record for races won in the UK National Hunt, having ridden 4,358 winners between 1995 and 2015? He also holds the remarkable record of being awarded Champion Jockey (i.e., most races won per season) in every single one of the 20 seasons for which he was a professional jockey. 	
Q3. On a standard Monopoly board, the squares which display this symbol are known by what two-word name?	
Q4. The Perth Scorchers and the Sydney Sixers are two of the most successful teams in what Australian cricket league? Established in 2011, it is one of the top 10 domestic sporting leagues in the world when measured by total weekly attendance.	
Q5. With 190 goals in total, what Canadian soccer player is the world's all-time leader for international goals scored, for either men or women? She is also only one of three players of either gender have scored at five different FIFA World Cup tournaments (the others being Marta and Cristiano Ronaldo).	
She would have claimed the record for herself but missed a penalty against Nigeria at this year's FIFA Women's World Cup, the sixth World Cup at which she played.	
Q6. Although this may shortly change with the 2023 final being played next month, who are currently the only country to have reached the men's Rugby World Cup final without ever winning the tournament?	
To date they have contested three finals: losing to New Zealand in 1987 and 2011, and to Australia in 1999.	
Q7. Formerly nicknamed "The Flying Tomato" due to his long red hair, who is this American snowboarder?	
He is the only person to have won 3 Olympic gold medals in snowboarding, winning the halfpipe event in 2006, 2010 and 2018.	
Q8. What is the two-word title of this mobile video game, in which players guide the titular creature between obstacles without hitting them?	
Released in 2013, the game's rampant popularity caused its Vietnamese programmer Dong Nguyen to remove it from both Apple and Google app stores in early 2014, though many unauthorised clones have since appeared.	



Q16. <i>Punto banco</i> and <i>Chemin de fer</i> are two forms of what card game , most frequently played in casinos?	
Q17. What German-born Austrian driver is the only person to posthumously win the Formula 1 Drivers Championship? Leading the table four races from the end of the season, he died in a crash during the practice session for the 1970 Italian Grand Prix.	
Q18. The Tokyo 2020 Olympics saw the introduction of the first ever mixed athletic event, in which both men and women compete in the same race. What was the name of this event? A precise answer (including distance) is required.	
Q19. Founded in 1948, this is the logo of what German sportswear company? Although their product range includes soccer balls, jerseys and kit bags, they are best known for producing goalkeeper gloves.	
 Q20. Born in Budapest in 1976, what Hungarian chess player is usually cited as the strongest female chess player of all time? First entering the FIDE Top 100 at age 12 – the youngest player of either gender ever to do so – in 1996 she became the first woman to reach the world top ten, and in 2002 defeated Garry Kasparov to become the first woman to beat a reigning world champion. Her sisters Sofia and Susan are also noted chess players. 	
Q21. Pictured are two of the cards from what bestselling card game, in which players must race to find a symbol visible on both cards of a pair? The full game consists of a deck of 55 cards, with the symbols mathematically distributed so that each randomly-chosen pair of cards has one and only one symbol in common.	
Q22. When Michael Phelps broke the world record for most Olympic medals won, he succeeded what Soviet gymnast, who had held the record for almost half a century? Born in present-day Ukraine in 1934, she won 18 medals in total (14 individual and 4 team) between 1956 and 1964, nine of which were gold medals.	
Q23. Not to be confused with philatelists or stamp collectors, the term "phillumenist" describes collectors of what other widely available, inexpensive items?	

Q24. Introduced in 2008, <i>Fast5</i> is a modified variant of what team sport? As the name suggests, this features shorter matches and only 5 players per team, instead of the usual 7.	
Although this sport's governing body gained Olympic recognition in 1995, this sport has never been played at the Summer Olympics to date.	
Q25. The closest winning margin in the history of the Tour de France occurred in 1989, when Greg LeMond mounted an astonishing comeback in the final stage to beat which French cyclist by a mere eight seconds?Image: Comparison of the Tour Later aerodynamic analysis suggests this man would have	
won if he had cut off his drag-causing ponytail.	
Q26. Self-described "mighty pirate" Guybrush Threepwood is the protagonist of what series of point-and-click adventure video games, developed by LucasArts? The first instalment was titled <i>The Secret of</i>	
[BLANK] in 1990 and the most recent was Return to [BLANK] in 2022 – the blanks in both cases being the two-word answer required.	
Q27. In a baseball context, the phrase "the shot heard round the world" describes a famous home run scored by Bobby Thomson of what MLB team as they beat the Brooklyn Dodgers to win the 1951 National League pennant?	
You may answer with the team's name at the time (identical to a still-current NFL team from the same city) <u>or</u> the team's current name, post their 1957 relocation. Either way, city <u>and</u> franchise name is required.	
Q28. In 1975, what Japanese mountaineer became the first woman to reach the summit of Mount Everest? In 1992 she also became the first woman to complete the so-called "Seven Summits" challenge, having climbed the highest peak in each of the seven continents.	
Q29. Gasing pangkah (Malaysia/Brunei) or Pambaram (India/Bangladesh) are competitive games for two or more players involving what objects , more usually regarded as traditional toys for children?	
Q30. Name the former Google executive who holds the current record for the world's highest skydive? In 2014, he jumped from a gas balloon at an altitude of 41.4km (135,000 feet), over 2km higher than Felix Baumgartner's highly-publicised 2012 jump.

You may answer with his name <u>or</u> the three-letter initialism by which he is frequently referred.		
Q13. In power for 62 years until his death in 1989, Hirohito reigning Japanese emperor in history, surpassing the previou which emperor , his grandfather, who sat on the Chrysanthe 45 years between 1867 and 1912?	us record held by

Q15. Makeda in Ethiopian tradition and Bilqīs in Arabic are alternate names for what Biblical monarch?	
She is generally regarded as having been the ruler of a south Arabian province – although whether she actually existed is debated by scholars. The Old Testament contains an account of her paying a royal visit to King Solomon bearing a lavish array of gifts.	
Q16. Often regarded as the greatest admiral in Chinese history, what explorer commanded the so-called "Ming treasure voyages", a series of 7 major expeditions around the Indian Ocean and South China Sea in the early 15 th century?	
Q17. When Lady Diana Spencer married Prince Charles in 1981, she surprisingly became the first Englishwoman to marry the first-in-line to the English throne since Anne Hyde married what future monarch over 300 years earlier? (Name <u>and</u> regnal number needed)	
Ironically, like Diana, Anne passed away without ever becoming Queen – she died of cancer in 1671 aged 34, more than a decade before her husband acceded to the throne.	
Q18. Its name an abbreviation of a Russian phrase meaning "death to spies", what umbrella body for Russian counter-espionage was established by Joseph Stalin in 1943?	
Although it was disbanded shortly after WWII, its name lives on in popular culture due to featuring in several of the early James Bond novels, before Ian Fleming created the fictional SPECTRE to serve as 007's antagonist instead.	
Q19. If, as expected, the 2024 US presidential election ends up being a re-run of Joe Biden vs Donald Trump, it would be only the 7 th such "presidential rematch" in American history, and the first since 1956, when Dwight D. Eisenhower defeated what Democratic nominee in a landslide, just as he had 4 years earlier?	
This former Illinois governor went on to serve as US Ambassador to the United Nations until his sudden death in 1965.	
Q20. The first female Prime Minister in Africa was Elisabeth Domitien, who held office between January 1975 and April 1976 in what country?	
She belonged to MESAN, a now-dissolved political party founded in 1949 to campaign for the independence of Ubangi-Shari, the French colony which was the predecessor of this modern-day country.	
Q21. Believed to have arrived there from the Philippines in roughly 1500 BCE, the Chamorro are the indigenous people of what Pacific archipelago?	
It may help you to know that this archipelago is divided into two geographic entities, although <u>neither</u> of them is a sovereign country.	

Q22. The War of Jenkin's Ear and King George's War are both considered part of what wider conflict of the 1740s, which pitted France, Prussia, Spain and their allies against the Habsburg monarchy and Great Britain?	
Q23. It's not Simón Bolivar, but who is this Argentine general (1778-1850) who helped lead the revolutions against Spanish rule in Argentina (1812), Chile (1818), and Peru (1821)? He earned the nickname "Hannibal of the Andes" following an 1817 incident where he led 5,000 troops in a 20-day, 480 km march across perilously steep mountain trails to mount a successful surprise attack on Spanish troops.	
Q24. Name this Georgian politician (1928-2014)? Serving as Soviet Minister of Foreign Affairs under Mikhail Gorbachev, he was a strong advocate of the reform policies of glasnost and perestroika and played a key role in the ending of the Cold War. After the breakup of the Soviet Union, he served as the President of Georgia from 1995 to 2003.	
Q25. Among the best-preserved Roman sites in the Mediterranean, the ancient city of Leptis Magna (known to the Greeks as Neápolis) is located in which modern-day country? Founded by the Phoenicians in the 7 th century BCE, it was greatly expanded in the early 3 rd century CE by Roman Emperor Septimius Severus, who was born in the city.	
Q26. Taking place during the second Persian invasion of Greece, in what battle of 480 BCE did a fleet of 371 Greek ships defeat a Persian fleet which was two to three times larger? In terms of the number of ships involved, this is estimated to have been the largest naval battle of all time.	
Q27. What Portuguese royal house was founded by King John I in 1385? Lasting for nearly two hundred years, monarchs of this dynasty oversaw the many significant Portuguese voyages which occurred during this period, including those of Bartolomeu Dias and Vasco da Gama.	
Q28. Sometimes referred to as "Dahomey Amazons", what was the name of the elite female warrior unit of the former West African kingdom of Dahomey? In existence between the 17 th and 19 th centuries, they have been described as the only all-female army in modern history and were the subject of the 2022 film <i>The Woman King</i> starring Viola Davis.	

Q29. Name this former Malaysian Prime Minister, who
ruled the country from 2009 to 2018?His time in office came to an abrupt end when he was
implicated in the 1MDB investment scandal and sentenced
to 12 years in prison for corruption.Q30. Pre-dating other societies such as the
Nazca and Moche, what extinct South
American civilisation flourished in the northern
Andean highlands of Peru from 900 BCE to 200
BCE?They are considered the earliest highly-
developed culture in pre-Columbian Peru, and
are notable for having the first widespread, recognisable artistic style seen in
any Andean civilisation.
