Q3 Unlike the New Testament, which was originally written in Greek, the Old Testament was primarily written in Hebrew, except for some chapters of the books of Daniel and Ezra which were written in what other ancient language?	<u>Aramaic</u>

Liffey Bridges

Q1 Dublin's newest Liffey bridge was recently announced, a pedestrian and cycle bridge to cross the river at what site in Islandbridge, near Kilmainham? This landscaped parkland area was commissioned in 1919 to honour more than 49,000 Irish soldiers killed while serving in the British Army.	Irish National <u>War Memorial Gardens</u>
Q2 What is the only currently disused bridge across the Liffey? Despite what you may assume from the lyrics, the track is not called <i>Solitary Sister</i> - instead please give its single-word title, which is not mentioned anywhere in the song.	<u>Killer</u>

The Dark Ages

Q1 Marked by a period of economic, intellectual, and cultural decline, the so-called Dark Ages were a centuries-long period beginning in the late 5th century CE following the fall of what once-dominant European political entity?	Western <u>Roman Empire</u>
Q2 Although the end of the Dark Ages is not well-defined, the beginning is universally agreed as 473 CE when which Roman Emperor was overthrown? Many historians have noted the curious coincidence that this final emperor bore the names of both the first king of Rome and the first emperor of Rome.	<u>Romulus Augustus</u> (accept <u>Augustulus</u> or <u>Romulus Augustulus</u>)
Q3 The term "Dark Ages" was coined by what Italian scholar and poet of the early Renaissance? He is arguably best known to history for devising a form of sonnet which bears his name.	Francis <u>Petrarch</u> / Francesco <u>Petrarca</u> / Francesco <u>di Petrarco</u>
Q4 The transition of Ireland from pagan to Christian rule happened in the first century of the Dark Ages, during the reign of what High King of Ireland? His inauguration in 539 CE followed the ancient pagan tradition, but he later named two of his sons after Irish saints, following his presumed conversion to Christianity. You may answer with simply this king's first name.	<u>Diarmait mac Cerbaill</u> (accept first or last name - also accept <u>Diarmuid</u> or <u>Dermot</u> for first name or <u>MacCarroll</u> , <u>Carroll</u> , <u>Carvill</u> or <u>MacCarville</u> for last name)
