This recent newspaper headline refers to what American-style mixed spirit drink, made from bourbon with vanilla and berry flavouring? Launched by Irish Distillers in 2013, it was quietly discontinued circa 2019 and has been highly sought after since - one bottle fetching €220 at auction earlier this month.	Zaconey
Q4	Its name an ancient Irish word for "glow", what white beer was launched by Guinness with a £5 million marketing campaign in 1998? You can answer with his first <b>or</b> last name.	Diarmait mac Murchada / Dermot MacMurrough / Dermot MacMurphy (accept first or last name)
Q3	Name the Republican governor of South Dakota who in her recent autobiography recounted an incident when she used a shotgun to put down a misbehaving family dog? Intending to show her willingness to make "tough decisions" and hence bolster her prospects of becoming Donald Trump's 2024 running mate, the episode has had the exact opposite effect - earning her bipartisan condemnation, including from Trump himself.	Kristi <u>Noem</u> (born Kristi <u>Arnold</u> )
Q4	The 2021 FASTER Act added what foodstuff to the list of allergens which must be declared on US food labelling? Perversely, the law caused this allergen to be added to even more foods, as many producers decided to meet the requirement by simply adding it as a listed ingredient rather than invest in costly cross-contamination avoidance.
